Course Title: Graphic Literature

Course Description:

In our world of increasingly multimedial cultural production, the graphic narrative, a mode of story-telling that combines images and texts, has obtained a new status as a serious genre in contemporary literature. This course aims to help students build their understanding of graphic story-telling and develop their ability to appreciate and analyze visual representations. We will begin by familiarizing ourselves with the language of comics and its close cousin, film, and then go on to explore graphic novel classics, with a focus on the ways in which graphic narratives help to express ideas about identity, memory, sexuality, spirituality, postmodernism, and the post-truth media landscape.

The course is conducted through a combination of lectures and group discussions.

Learning Outcomes:

Students will become improve their visual literacy.

Students will develop the ability to analyze and interpret contemporary multimedial literature. Students will be able to learn to engage in scholarly discussions with their peers.

Class Policies:

1. Attendance
