# Islam and the West 伊斯蘭與西方文化

This course introduces students to Islam in its basic themes and texts and its historical relation to the West. We will begin the course by investigating the core of Islam in its beliefs, values, traditions, institutions, and historical development. In particular, our study will focus on Muhammad, the Qur'an, Arabic language and civilization in historical context, and the formation of Islam in its early phases. After examining selections from the Qur'an and the Hadith in the first weeks of the semester, we will move on to historical and cultural relations between Islam and the West and examine the way art and literature deal with Islam as a global, multicultural, and multilingual phenomenon today. Readings from Edward Said's *Orientalism* and responses to it will inform our discussion of the politics of Islam for the West as well as Muslim perspectives themselves on Islam and the West.

N.B. This is a secular study of Islam and the West. If you think you already understand Islam and its texts, this is not a course for you. If you want to learn Islamic spirituality and improve yourself morally, this is not the course for you. You can contact an Islamic center in Taiwan and enroll in their classes for religious education. On the other hand, if you are looking to spread any of the hateful opinions regarding Islam or its perceived historical or political enemies in class, this is also not a course for you. This is a course of human knowledge, and hatred and racism have no place in it at all. Your instructor will not tolerate any practice or expression of hatred or racism in the class and will take measures to hold you responsible for lack of respect and honor in an academic setting. Antisemitism, Islamophobia (including but not exclusive to identifying Islam as terrorism), homophobia, sexism, racism, as well as other forms and expressions of hatred and violence will be interpreted as bullying, harassment, and defamation that violate academic respect and honor and will result in harsh grade penalties.
