# Shakespeare 莎士比亞

In this course, we will study major plays of Shakespeare that cover the dramatic genres of the English Renaissance. We will begin our course with the study of romance in the *Tempest*, move on to a further probing of love, family, identity, and power in a problem play, Merchant of Venice, and then to As You Like It, a major comedy. The latter half of the course will be devoted to the tragedies and histories that explore issues of politics and tyranny. Besides the four tragedies of Julius Caesar, Hamlet, King Lear, and Macbeth, we will discuss Shakespeare's interpretation and popularization of the turbulent period of English history before the Tudor monarchs of his time in Richard II, 1 Henry IV, and Henry V. The approach we take to the study of Shakespeare in this course emphasizes literary form and historical contexts. Reading and analyzing these plays in terms of genre development and the playwright's engagement with the events and major issues and debates of his time, we will examine these plays in terms of their relevance to Shakespeare's time and to our time. The way power relations and the social order are enacted on Shakespeare's stage expresses his vision of the dynamic between theater and reality. Our discussion of the plays will focus on Shakespeare's conceptualization of historical condition and the socio-political dynamic of lived reality. We will investigate the playwright's engagement with politics and culture in the world of drama, and practice Shakespearean criticism with an awareness of the playwright's modernity and relevance, from his concerns with the nature of authority and colonial power, to identity and the other, and to gender relations.
