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Course Aims / Description

Primary aim	This one-year course is designed to improve and enhance students' overall English competence through listening, speaking, and reading activities plus grammar review and vocabulary development. Students will have opportunities to learn the key components of English (pronunciation, vocabulary, and grammar) and practice anguage learning strategies, get exposed to English in any form (listening, reading, speaking, and even writing), and develop their confidence and fluency while they are practicing and performing various language tasks in the classroom and outside the classroom. After having taken this course, students are expected to consolidate their essential knowledge of English language and engage themselves in everyday and even authentic communication. Requirements —Students are required to prepare the designated learning activities BEFOREHAND , REGULARLY attend the class, ACTIVELY participate in classroom activities, and complete each assignment ON TIME . Aside from class participation and practices based on the textbook, students are encouraged to work on a self-access learning project based on designated videos, reading texts, and online English-learning materials. In this class, students will have opportunity to 1. review and practice simple present and continuous tenses, perfect tenses and narrative tenses to express and discuss various living topics 2. build up theme-based vocabulary and even academic words for and through reading and listening to conversations, interviews, talks, and lectures			
	 while listening, reading, speaking and writing 4. manage and present information, perspectives, or problem-solving in speaking and writing tasks or activities 5. show innovative research skills through in-class activities and after-class assignments
