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Course Goals / Description

中高級英文三聽講為一門 2 學分學期課程,為訓練中高級程度之大一學生習得進階主題式英語溝通與表達,強化學生思考、組織及表達的整合技能;並培養學生發現問題、以英語提問並表達意見的能力,經由實境口說與演講訓練,增進學生英語聽力及訓練演說技巧。

This semester-based English III course is specifically designed to enhance Freshman students' listening & speaking competency at the intermediate to high-intermediate level. Students are required to prepare the designated passages BEFORE class, ACTIVELY participate in class discussions and complete exercise sections ON TIME.

Listening input: A variety of authentic English contexts, including talks, discussions, and conversations not only help expand students' existing knowledge about interesting and contemporary topics, but also guide them systematically through strategies and activities to meet future academic, personal or professional goals. Specific learning points are focused in each theme-based chapter, where students effectively learn to manage lengthy listening input by predicting, identifying main ideas/details, and taking notes. Pronunciation is also highlighted to improve students' listening comprehension and speaking fluency.

Speaking output: Presentation skills inspired by the Ted talks give students the techniques and authentic language they need to deliver their own presentations. Accuracy-based and fluency-based activities for specific communicative functions will help students gain the opportunity to personalize the language they learn, and to build their confidence in expressing their ideas and opinions. Communicative speaking activities including games, role-plays, and conversation practice are designed to reinforce the chapter content and to allow students to practice integrated language skills. Individual and group projects/presentations will also be given throughout the semester.

The ultimate goal of this course is the encourage students to take charge of their own learning and to facilitate the essential 1 21st century skills – collaboration, communication and critical thinking.

Class Rules

1. Class attendance, lesson preparation and active class participation are required.

Attendance & Participation Rules:

- a. Attendance will be taken regularly throughout the semester. If you are all present whenever I call the roll, you will get **90 points** (i.e. the primitive score) in this category (i.e. Class attendance).
- b. If you are absent for <u>2 hours</u> (i.e., one class), <u>10 points</u> will be deducted from this primitive score.
- c. If you are absent due to circumstances beyond your control (e.g. illness, emergency, important occasions, school events etc.), please give me the valid written proof **within two weeks.** The receipt or medication bag with a correct stamp of date by accredited hospitals will count for a valid proof. Every student is only allowed to have <u>6 hours</u> (i.e., three classes) excused absence.
- d. If you have 8 hours (i.e., FOUR classes) unexcused absence, you will definitely be flunked.
- e. Being late for more than **20 minutes** is treated as absence from that hour (**5 points** will be deducted).

- f. Frequent lateness will also be punished with the deduction of points. **Four** lateness (within 20 minutes) will result in deduction of **5 points**.
- g. If you are not obeying class rules, for example, using your cell phone or continuously talking to your neighbor when the teacher is giving lecture or not able to locate the sentence to read when you are called upon, **5 points** will be deducted from the primitive score.
- h. If you are caught asleep during one class period, **5 points** will be deducted from the primitive score.
- 2. Absence from a class is **NO** excuse for not knowing the assignment and what has been discussed in that class. It is YOUR responsibility to ask your fellow classmates what has been covered and what will be doing in the class.
- 3. <u>Plagiarism</u> and <u>cheating</u> on the exam is <u>absolutely not permitted</u>. If someone is found plagiarizing or cheating on an exam, it means he/she will get a zero point for that exam.
- 4. There will be **NO make-up exams/presentations** unless valid and official reasons for absence are presented **beforehand**.
- 5. The handouts given in the class should be kept at least till the end of the semester for later reference or final exam.
- 6. Cellular phones should be stored in your bag when there are exams and presentations. If your are caught using your cell phone on an exam, it will be treated as cheating. If you are caught using your cell phone or other electronic devices during student presentations, 20 points will be deducted from the primitive score of attendance.
- 7. Due to lack of budget, every student has to pay NT50 for copying fees in the beginning of the semester.
- 8. AI regulations:
 - Prohibited use of AI in this course. The use of generative AI tools is prohibited in this course to ensure the authenticity of learning outcomes and foster students' independent thinking. Please note the established monitoring mechanisms in place.
